


## **Community Engagement Principles**

- Enhancing electricity awareness and improved access to information





Attributes	<ul><li>Breadth of knowledge about constituency</li><li>Current and direct connection to community</li></ul>
Nominations	<ul> <li>Open process; nominations open for 3 weeks</li> <li>Combination of ads, e-blasts, notifications</li> </ul>
Meetings	<ul><li>Twice per year or as required</li><li>Facilitated by a Secretariat</li></ul>
